Having a Will that is up to date and prepared professionally is really important.

It makes sure that you are in control and that your wishes are carried out after you pass away. It is your way of making sure that the people and causes that you really care about are looked after.

Our 'Will You' guide will help. Whether you are thinking about writing your first Will or are amending your existing Will, it does not have to be a difficult or expensive process.

Some people believe that their estate will automatically pass to their spouse, partner, or children. Sadly, that is not the case. If you die without an up to date and valid Will you are considered by the state to be 'intestate.' This means that the law decides who inherits your property, money and belongings.

These rules can be very strict – for example, they do not provide for stepchildren. Also, unmarried partners do not currently have an automatic entitlement. This means that they must apply to the court to inherit your estate. Whether or not an unmarried partner receives anything is at the discretion of the court.

Preparing to make Your Will

It is generally straightforward to prepare or amend your will. It does not have to be complicated.

Our recommendation is that you use a solicitor to help prepare your Will. This will ensure that it is accurate, legally binding and ensure that your wishes are fulfilled. To find a solicitor you can contact the Law society NI for advice at www.lawsoc-ni.org

You may need to update your will - if for example you get married or re-marry, your Will automatically becomes void. You may want to add children or grandchildren to your Will, add extra organisations or charities to your Will.

You are advised to review your will every few years to make sure it still reflects your wishes, particularly if there are any significant changes in your life.

To ensure that changes to your will are legal and validated your changes must be carried out using a legal document, a codicil or if you prefer you could make a new Will. Failure to do so may result in your changes having no legal effect and could render your existing Will invalid.

Keeping It Simple - Steps to help you make your Will

Before visiting a solicitor, you should do some preparation. This will save time and may also save you money.

- List your assets: Put together a list of your assets / estimated value (see checklist)
- Record what you owe or are owed: Write down everything you owe or are owed. Remember to include mortgage repayments, outstanding loans, or payments due. This will help you establish the true value of your estate.
- Who will benefit: Think about who you would like to benefit from your Will. Write down a list of those people and organisations/charities that you would like to benefit and how you would like to share your estate.
- Choose your executors: You can appoint between 1 and 4 people (executors) to be responsible for ensuring that your wishes are carried out. These can be family members, friends or you can ask a solicitor. Once you have agreed with your executors then you are ready to meet with your solicitor to prepare your Will.
- Make sure it's signed: Once you have written your Will, you will need to get it witnessed and signed. Your witnesses cannot be people that stand to benefit from your Will. Nor can they be married to someone that will benefit.
- **Keep it safe:** Once written and signed make sure the Will is kept in a safe place. You can leave it with a solicitor, legal advisor and keep your own copy in a safe place. Make sure your executors know where to find it.

Your Estate - assets and liabilities

You will need to work out the value of your assets. That could be your home, savings, any investments you may have, personal items or any savings you have.

You will also need to work out your liabilities. That would include any outstanding bank loans, credit card bills. If you take the total value of your assets and subtract the value of your liabilities, that will give you a clearer understanding of the value of your estate.

Why not use this simple checklist. The value of your assets minus the value of your liabilities will determine the value of your estate.

Types of Gift

There are different ways of leaving a gift in your will to people, organisations, and charities that you want to support and include in your will.

Leaving a Cash Gift

You can leave a gift of cash, specifying a sum of money that you would like to gift or you can specify a fixed percentage of the total estate value.

Leaving a Residuary Gift

You can leave a percentage of your estate value after all other gits have been made and any debts cleared. Doing that i.e., dividing whatever is left over after other gifts into percentages, will make it less likely that you will need to amend your will at a later stage. The percentage will remain unchanged, but the value of your estate may rise or fall over time. This is why many people leave residuary gifts, a percentage of their estate after all other gifts to charity.

When making or amending your will please consider leaving a gift to LLNI. It is a very easy way to ensure that you can continue a lifetime of support for a cause and charity that you really care about.

Remember your loved ones - first and foremost. Your will is a way to make sure that your loved ones are taken care of after you die. How to leave a gift to LLNI

Leaving a Residuary Gift

Leaving a Pecuniary gift
